

YOUR ITINERARY

DAY 1~THURSDAY~ APRIL 10 USA/EN ROUTE

Your adventure begins as you board your overnight flight to Cape Town. (Meals Aloft)

DAY 2~FRIDAY~ APRIL 11 CAPE TOWN

This evening, arrive in Cape Town, South Africa's "Mother City". Upon arrival, you will be met by your specialist guide and escorted to your hotel. The provincial capital, Cape Town, is a sophisticated city with plenty to see and do, particularly around the Victoria and Alfred Waterfront area, where delightful buildings of the Cape Dutch and Victorian-era architecture have been restored as shops, restaurants, museums and pubs, while the busy water traffic of the docks goes on unabated.

Your home for the next three nights, the Vineyard hotel and Spa, with over 200 years of history within its walls, is situated in six acres of attractive landscaped parkland on the banks of the Liesbeeck River. Located in the lush leafy suburb of Newlands, the Vineyard Hotel & Spa is within easy walking distance of the upmarket Cavendish Shopping Centre and is just 10 minutes away from the City Center and the popular Victoria & Alfred Waterfront. This beautiful establishment comprises the original home of Lady Anne Barnard and new bedrooms designed by highly acclaimed architects Jack Barnett and Revel Fox. It is filled with works by leading South African artists and offers rooms ranging from single to family suites, both mountain and courtyard facing. DAY 3~SATURDAY~ APRIL 12 CAPE TOWN~ CAPE PENINSULA

Your luxury motorcoach takes you on a breathtaking coastal drive to the Cape of Good Hope. You are surrounded by spectacular mountains, rugged shorelines, and the blue sea below. See Devil's Peak, Lion's Head, Table Mountain and the Twelve Apostles. Pass quaint seaside towns as you continue to Cape Point where the stormy waters of the Atlantic meet up with the calm waters of the Indian Ocean. At Cape Point, climb the steps or ride a funicular to the top where you can explore a lighthouse, enjoy the views, or even indulge in a bit of shopping. Take a close look at the ocean where you may see southern right whales in the spring and early summer as well as dolphins and a





variety of seabirds. You will also have the chance to explore the Cape Point Nature Reserve which is host to approximately half of the 2,700 species of indigenous plants contained in the Cape Peninsula. Look for the distinctive orange found in leucospermums, one of the rarest types of proteas – the mimites, marvel at the helicrysums and pelarganium calcullums, and enjoy the ericas, phenacomas and fine bush which the Dutch called "fynbos." There are 250 species of birds in the reserve, ranging from ostriches to minuscule sunbirds. Caracal, chacma baboon, a wide variety of buck and various other mammal species may be seen, including Cape Mountain zebra and the bontebok which is endemic to this part of the world. The baboons feed occasionally on marine foods which they garner at low tide. At Olifants Bay, look for Oystercatchers, and enjoy some superb birding.

Enjoy lunch at Bertha's restaurant, and continue to Boulders Beach where the African (Jackass) Penguins can be seen – also known as the Black-footed Penguins. These flightless seabirds are found only on the coast of Southern Africa and the only penguins found on this continent. Enjoy a delightful walk on a specially built platform onto the little sheltered beach where they nest among the rocks, and "waddle" up and down into and out of the sea. Since the penguins are accustomed to human presence you can safely get within a few feet of them as you stand on the platform, and it is sometimes possible to view them nesting behind rocks and bushes.


Return to Cape Town and envoy a welcome dinner and interactive drumming at the Gold Restaurant. Overnight at the VINEYARD HOTEL AND SPA. (B,L,D)



DAY 4~SUNDAY~ APRIL 13

CAPE TOWN: TABLE MOUNTAIN/KIRSTENBOSCH GARDENS

Get a feel of what Cape Town is all about by taking the cable car to the top of Table Mountain, the signature of this city. This tour is dependent on the wind factor, as well as the clouds. Clouds often cover this flat-topped mountain, which rises to 3,563 feet above sea level and the locals affectionately say it's a white tablecloth. Legend has it that a retired pirate,



on climbing the mountain, met up with the devil. In order to preserve his soul, the pirate challenged the devil in a smoking contest. So, they stoked up their pipes and have been smoking ever since. For centuries Table Mountain has been a guiding beacon to mariners rounding the Cape of Southern Africa.

Sir Francis Drake described it as "the most-stately thing and the fairest cape we saw in the whole circumference of the earth." Despite its formidable appearance, it is possible to hike up Table Mountain. The first recorded ascent was in 1503 by the Portuguese navigator Antonio da Saldanha who, confused by the Cape Peninsula geography, climbed to the summit via the frontal cleft, now known as Platteklip Gorge. For nature lovers, the birding is awesome, and the wildflowers include agapanthus, watsonias, and red nerines which poke out from rock crevices amid a scrub of ericas and gnarled proteas. More than 1400 species of flowering plants have been recorded on the mountain, which makes it a spectacular sight in the spring. Cute guinea pig-like creatures known as rock dassies, or hyraxes, (genetically, the closest living relatives to elephants) scuttle everywhere. They are not afraid and scamper among the tourists seeking to be fed.

Have lunch at Moyo Kirstenbosch and continue to Kirstenbosch Botanical Gardens,

arguably one of the most beautiful gardens in the world. Founded in 1913, Kirstenbosch lies on the eastern slopes of Table Mountain and consists of landscaped gardens of indigenous plants and trees, watered by the Liesbeek River, as well as natural forest that extend up to the lower slopes. Kirstenbosch covers an area of 1,383 acres, 148 of which are cultivated; the remainder is a natural flora reserve. It is a living display featuring 9,000 of the estimated 20,000 species of indigenous South African flora, and close to 50% of the peninsula's floral wealth. In the cultivated area, related plants are grouped together and radiate from the central lawns like the spokes of a wheel. Among the interesting sections here are the Cycad

Amphitheatre, which hosts most species of these "living fossils" found in southern Africa; the famed Protea Garden on the higher slopes, with its profuse growth of silver trees (Leucadendron argenteum); the JV Mathews Rock Garden (named after the first curator) containing succulents of the genera Crassula, Aloe,

Lampranthus and Euphorbia; the Erica Garden and the Pelargonium Koppie. Two streams cut through Kirstenbosch, both laced with besembos, red alder, and hard fern. Of historical interest is an avenue of camphor trees and fig trees planted by Cecil Rhodes in 1898, and a small section of wild almond (Brabejum stellatifolium) hedge planted by Dutch settler Jan van Riebeeck in 1660. Birds of all sorts can be seen

here as well - Dusky and Paradise Flycatchers, sunbirds, Klaas's cuckoos, bulbuls, pigeons, brilliant green and red Cape Sugarbirds (which pollinate the flowers), guinea fowls, and the Cape Batis Overnight at the VINEYARD HOTEL AND SPA. (B,L)







DAY 5~MONDAY~ APRIL 14 CAPE TOWN/HERMANUS

Leave Cape Town behind and drive to Hermanus, on the world-famous whale coast of South Africa. Hermanus is generally considered the best land-based whale-watching destination in the world. From June to December, the bay becomes the swimming grounds for a large number of southern right whales. From June to December, is quite possibly the only place in the world where one can see a mighty whale and a great white shark on the same boat trip (all less than 20 minutes from the harbor!) While there may not be many whales in April, this is a coveted destination year-round as it a warm and beautiful destination and is home to unequalled marine life.



You will stay at the 5-star hotel, The Marine, one of South Africa's most spectacular seaside hotels, overlooking Walker Bay and Cape Point. The Hotel offers 40 individually decorated bedrooms and luxury suites, each adorned with rich textures, bathrooms, and living rooms with minibars, tea & coffee-making machines. Free in-room Wi-Fi is available to all guests, along with dry cleaning/laundry services and a bar.

DAY 6~TUESDAY~ APRIL 15 HERMANUS

Enjoy a boat-based excursion or Marine cruise from Gansbaai, *weather permitting*. Once you have arrived at The Great White House in Gansbaai, you will receive a brief introductory talk about the route, safety, and what to look out for. Passengers are fitted with comfortable life jackets and waterproof jackets. Trip lengths are between 2 and 2.5 hours, depending on sightings and weather conditions. Dyer Island is located 4.9 miles from shore and is an access controlled Important Bird Area (IBA) for the conservation of its many resident bird species, including African penguins. Adjacent to Dyer Island is Geyser Rock, home to a 60,000 strong Cape fur seal colony. These seals are present all year round. Venture into the channel between Dyer Island and Geyser Rock, the world-famous "Shark Alley."





Shark Cage Diving (\$270 per person, additional):

The thrill of a lifetime, feel the exposure of diving with nature's most feared predator while remaining safe inside the shark cage. The trip focus on the natural predation and breaching of sharks as well as shark cage diving. The expedition operates in small groups and takes a maximum of 7 guests per trip. As the groups are small, the tour provides an intimate experience as well as having the opportunity to pass on knowledge and passion for the sharks and the area. The cage is fixed to the boat and guests are allowed to snorkel in the cage (diving certification is not required for this purpose). Overnight at THE MARINE HERMANUS HOTEL. (B)

DAY 7~WEDNESDAY~ APRIL 16 HERMANUS/WINELANDS/FRANSCHHOEK

Depart for the Winelands region of the Cape, an artist's pallet. A tapestry of vineyards interwoven with the historic towns of Stellenbosch, Paarl, and Franschhoek at the base of the Boland Mountains engulfs you. The cradle of the South African fruit and wine industries, every season offers enchanting foliage: spring flowers, summer fruits, autumn leaves, and the fresh greenery of the rainy winter.

Discover the internationally acclaimed vineyards of Stellenbosch, Paarl, and Franschhoek on the Western Cape, along a most scenic route.






Enjoy lunch and wine pairing at Flavours restaurant, and in the afternoon, visit the historic estate of Boschendal with some of the most brilliantly preserved Cape Dutch buildings in the Cape, and its collection of priceless period furniture. Visitors to Boschendal can savor exceptional wines as well as sample limited releases only available on the estate in the course of a chocolate gourmet encounter.

Your accommodation is immersed in the Cape Provençal style. Of course, some call it an Auberge, others an exclusive country inn. From any point of view, Le Quartier Français is a splash of style in the heart of the historic village of Franschhoek, a quaint corner of the Cape Winelands that is forever a little French. Set in tranquil *surroundings, the reception, lounge, and 11 Auberge rooms plus* additional suites are set against the mystic backdrop of the Franschhoek Mountains and overlook a central landscaped garden with a natural pool. The beautiful lodge is known for its quality food and restaurants and you're sure to enjoy the food while here.



Days 9/10/11~Friday/Saturday/Sunday~ April 18/19/20 Winelands/Cape Town/Kruger National Park~ Imbali Safari Lodge

Return to Cape Town this morning and board your schedule flight to Kruger National Park (*Skukuza*), one of the world's great national parks. It is home to an unparalleled diversity of wildlife and is maintained by one of the world's most sophisticated management systems. Five rivers cross the park from west to east. There are 300 different types of trees, 49 species of fish, 34 types of amphibians, 116 different reptilian species, 505 species of birds and 147 species of mammals in the park.

Your guide will interpret the ecosystems and animal behavior, and help you to identify the strands in the web of life. The park is frequented by browsers and grazers such as giraffe, kudu, impala, zebra, wildebeest, and buffalo.



Elephant and white rhino are also common. Predators include lion, leopard, cheetah, hyena, and side-striped jackal, as well as wild dog.

A variety of activities are available at the lodge. These include wildlife safaris, guided walks, health spa visits, bush picnics and champagne breakfasts. Video and slide presentations, traditional dancing, storytelling, special interest talks and even a canoe ride or a visit to the Sangoma or traditional healer can be arranged.





Within the untouched wilderness of the Kruger National Park, Imbali Safari Lodge continues the tradition of safari in the romantic style of the past. DAY 12~ MONDAY~ APRIL 21 Kruger National Park/Johannesburg

Transfer to the airport today for your flight to Johannesburg. Often called Jo'burg, Johannesburg is the country's largest city and financial center with ultra-modern skyscrapers and a bustling way of life. It is the city of gold, as its claim to fame is the gold that was discovered close-by. There are many things to do in Johannesburg – relax, shop, sightsee and take in the local flavor.

Your accommodation for this evening is The Peech, a truly boutique hotel. Set in the chic suburb of Melrose, a short stroll from the hustle and bustle of the city, it is ideally situated just ten minutes from shopping, across the James Gray Park and adjacent to the Wanderers



International Cricket Stadium. The Peech was originally a private residence built in the 1950's. The hotel opened for its first guests in 2004 following an extensive transformation to enhance the original personality of the property while providing all of the services

required by modern travelers. It features luxury rooms, contemporary design and is an unexpected city oasis. The rooms are modern and edgy with an indigenous, African feel – offer free Wi-Fi, flat screen TV, iPod Sound Docks, Nespresso machines and generous bathrooms featuring "Rain dance" showers. It has a charming bistro, lush gardens, outdoor swimming pool and access to a nearby gym.

JOHANNESBURG ~ APARTHEID MUSEUM & SOWETO/DEPARTURE

Get ready for an exciting day as you travel back in time to revisit South Africa's history with a trip to the Mandela Family Museum, the Apartheid Museum and Hector Peterson Square in Soweto. Once the home of Nobel Peace Prize winner Nelson Mandela, the Mandela Family Museum is now comprised of memorabilia from world leaders and scholars, paintings, and photographs of the Mandela family. The Apartheid Museum reflects on segregation and the birth of the democratic country that rose out of this dark period while the memorial to slain 12-year-old, Hector Peterson, for resisting police and the Apartheid government reminds us of those brave and innocent souls lost in the fight for equality.

For anyone wanting to understand and experience what South Africa was really like, a visit to the Apartheid Museum is fundamental. The museum is a beacon of hope showing the world how South Africa is coming to terms with the past and working towards a future that all South African's can call their own. This museum illustrates the rise and fall of apartheid. Visitors walk through the 22 individual exhibition areas, which contain film footage, photographs, text panels



and artifacts illustrating the events and human stories behind apartheid. The Apartheid Museum is the story of the triumph of the human spirit over adversity.

In the afternoon, visit the black suburb of Soweto (the name is an abbreviation of Southwestern Townships) for a look at all types of neighborhoods, ranging from shanty towns and worker's hostels to the modern home of Nelson Mandela (he lived there for only a short while upon his release from prison, and it's where Winnie, his ex-wife, now lives.) You can also see Mandela's earlier and more humble home, where he lived when he was arrested all those years ago.

Later, transfer to the airport for your departure flight home. (B,L; Meals Aloft)

DAY 13~TUESDAY~ APRIL 22 JOHANNESBURG ~APARTHEID MUSEUM & SOWETO

Today you'll tour, as per main program, the Apartheid Museum and Soweto. In the afternoon, the group departs for the USA, and you settle in for one more night at the Fairlawns before your next adventure to Zimbabwe and Victoria Falls. Overnight at the PEECH HOTEL. (B,L)

DAYS 14/15/16~ WEDNESDAY/ THURSDAY/FRIDAY~ APRIL 23/24/25

JOHANNESBURG/VICTORIA FALLS, ZIMBABWE

Transfer to the airport for your flight to Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe, to view the mighty Victoria Falls. At more than twice the size of Niagara Falls it's no surprise that Victoria Falls are among the Seven Wonders of the World. Mosi-oa-Tunya – The Smoke that Thunders, derived from the towering column of spray when the Zambezi River runs high, is the name that Zimbabwe's local people have given to this awesome natural phenomenon. The name is probably more appropriate and descriptive than "Victoria", which has a far too calm and composed ring to it to do justice to the masses of thundering, swirling water of these spectacular Falls. But all Dr. David Livingstone probably thought of when he named the Falls after his Queen in 1855 was his royal duty. Five separate falls make up this incredible spectacle that plunges more than 328 feet into a sheer-sided chasm which separates Zimbabwe from Zambia. The awe-inspiring abyss is spanned by a 1905 Edwardian bridge which links the two countries, and many adventurers now use to bungee jump. The masses of water plunging down the Falls and into the gorge below originate from the mighty Zambezi River that meanders through more than 1,677 miles of African countryside.

An afternoon sundowner cruise will be a highlight as you glide along the Zambezi River, watching hippos snort, elephants drink on the riverbank, monkeys jump from branch to branch, birds fly overhead or pose for a photograph on the branches, and much more. Enjoy your gin and tonic, cool beer, or drink of choice, and see a panoramic sunset as the sun dips below the horizon, painting the whole area in unbelievable colors of brilliant reds, yellows, purples and mauves.



THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT SOUTHERN AFRICA

Participants:

- Participants must be able to climb in and out of safari 4x4 vehicles or minibuses, small aircraft and boats/canoes unassisted. They should also be able to tolerate riding on uneven, bumpy dirt roads for long periods of time (6-8 hours maximum), as well as some off-road experiences when opportunities allow.
- Participants should also be able to stand and/or walk moderate distances at an easy pace for up to a few hours at a time when visiting villages, towns, or other sites. Some, if not most, of this walking may be on uneven ground or uphill, often at higher elevations and altitudes that many people are not used to.

In general, this trip requires:

- Flexibility and good humor unexpected changes and/or glitches will occur
- A spirit of adventure and curiosity
- Interest in and willingness to appreciate a destination with uneven infrastructure and a bending definition of comfort. That being said, some locations are nestled in absolute luxury where pampering is the norm.
